We are dedicating the 2017-2018 season to the Eclipse and we will be exploring the arts through social engagement. Through theatre, music, multimedia, dance and spoken word performances, we aim to redistribute the past into the present by negotiating ideas of real versus preconceived perceptions of many themes related to our 2017 reality. The Northern Arts and Cultural Centre has implemented a large range of programming throughout the Northwest Territories and we invite you to take part in our season shows, special shows, festivals, Northern Scene series, monthly arts exhibitions, community group performances, pre-concerts and outreach projects.

SUSAN AGLUKARK

Walking between two worlds to celebrate Canada's 150

An Inuk from Arviat, Nunavut, Susan Aglukark has been walking between two worlds. Her story is an important one to recall on Canada's 150th anniversary.

She was a rare and exotic presence in the mainstream music world – an Inuk woman, a modern woman, a strong woman with something important to say is sometimes very rare in the entertainment industry — and Susan embodies pure, graceful honesty and strength. As her songs climbed the charts, her stories and her candor about the struggles of Aboriginal communities, and her bravery as she opened up about her own anger and struggle, won her an audience beyond that of most pop artists.

Aglukark's musical success is even more interesting when you realize she didn't start her career until she was 24. With no modern musical orthodoxy to draw on, Aglukark was free to respond to the sounds and styles that touched or motivated or inspired her.

The appeal of her music is that in an era where the most popular music is often less relevant than style or mood, her lyrics are where she lives.

Beyond the national stage

The list of people she has performed before include: Queen Elizabeth (twice), prime ministers Jean Chrétien and Brian Mulroney, French president Jacques Chirac, Nelson Mandela and former governor general Adrienne Clarkson.

She has earned three Juno Awards, the first ever Aboriginal Achievement Award in arts and entertainment, a Canadian Country Music Association Rising Star Award, a Native American Music Award and a Canadian Aboriginal Music Award.

CAFÉ DAUGHTER

National acclaimed one-woman drama tells the tale of reclaimed Cree heritage


Yvette Wong is a girl of mixed heritage growing up in Saskatchewan in the 1950s. Her father is Chinese and he runs a small-town café. Her mother is Cree. When Yvette is 10, her mother extracts a promise from her: that she never tell anyone she is Cree. Yvette holds this secret close to her heart – until the moment she can no longer hide her heritage from herself. Based on the true story of Sen. Lillian Eva Quan Dyck – also a neuroscientist – Café Daughter is the powerful, funny and touching tale of one woman's journey to reclaim her heritage.

This Workshop West Playwrights' Theatre play was written by Cree playwright Kenneth T. Williams and stars Northerner Tiffany Ayalik, also a 2017 Juno winner of Indigenous Album of the Year for her part in Quantum Tangle's Tiny Hands.

The Yellowknife-born Inuk woman studied acting at Red Deer College and at the University of Alberta to graduate with a BFA in acting. As for why she was chosen for this performance, director Lisa C. Ravensbergen said she wanted someone who she trusted to embody the character. This show has been performed nationally.

KO K'E MUSIC AND SPOKEN WORD FESTIVAL

Northern stories take the stage for Canada's 150

The Ko K'e spoken word festival is a celebration of Northern culture marking 150 years of colonialism in Canada including Indigenous, English and French perspectives. Participants use a variety of storytelling techniques to share the story of the North including music and poetry.



KIERA-DAWN KOLSON (PERFORMING IN YK)

Kiera-Dawn Kolson is an award-winning multidisciplinary artist from Denendeh. She released her debut album The Dawning of a New Era in the summer of 2016 and enjoys working with Indigenous youth and communities as a cultural facilitator, singer-songwriter, poet and artist, with the objective of educating and empowering the current and next generations.

BATISTE FOISY (PERFORMING IN YK)

Batiste Foisy has performed on several stages in Canada and abroad, notably at the 24h de Slam festival in Liège, Belgium, the Lausanne Slam 2.0 festival in Switzerland and the Virage festival in Sainte-Rose-du-Nord, Quebec. This performance will include explicit content and is recommended for an adult audience.





CAROLINE COX (PERFORMING OUTSIDE YK)




Caroline Cox is a songwriter, poet and filmmaker based out of a remote homestead on the Liard River.



COLLECTIF9

'Dazzling' genre-bending nine-member string band

Montreal's cutting-edge classical string band collectif9 has been gathering steam since 2011, attracting diverse audiences in varied spaces. Known for energized, innovative arrangements of classical repertoire, collectif9 employs lights, staging and amplification more commonly seen at rock acts, and heralds a new age in genre-bending classical performance. collectif9 has already performed more than 70 concerts across Canada and beyond, from Quebec's Côte-Nord to China, including summer appearances at the Festival de Lanaudière in Joliette, Quebec, and Ottawa Chamberfest.

The ensemble combines the power of an orchestra with the crispness of a chamber ensemble for a unique experience.

collectif9's debut album, Volksmobiles, was released in February 2016. Featuring folk-inspired music by composers Brahms, Bartók, Schnittke and André Gagnon, collectif9's album also presents the world premiere recording of

Canadian composer Geof Holbrook's Volksmobiles, written for the ensemble.

The musicians and friends met as students at Université de Montréal and McGill University. They wanted to create something different yet complementary to traditional representations of classical music, more relatable to pop culture. Learning from the classical works that have influenced non-classical musicians and the structure of pop concerts, collectif9 looks for ways to break the stigma of unapproachability, searches for new ways of expression within the classical medium, and attempts to foster communication and collaboration between artists and within their community.

Their Northern tour will see five members in performances outside of Yellowknife, after which a full nine-member presentation will take place within the territorial capital.

Classical meets contemporary in a program including Yellowknife composer Carmen Braden's string quartet, The Raven Conspiracy, as well as the world premiere of a work featuring throatsinger Sylvia Cloutier and Yellowknife's own Leela Gilday.

CARMEN BRADEN

Carmen Braden is a Western Canadian Music Awardsnominated composer-performer from Yellowknife. Carmen's music is greatly tied to her sub-Arctic soundscape. She draws from various environmental and human phenomena through sonic, visual, sensual and scientific ways of understanding.

SYLVIA CLOUTIER

Sylvia Cloutier, originally from Kuujjuaq, Nunavik (Northern Quebec) but now living in Iqaluit, is well-known for performing Inuit throatsinging and drum dancing. She has collaborated with many artists all over the world and joined Governor General Michaëlle Jean on a state visit to Norway and Ukraine in 2009.

LEELA GILDAY

A passionate singer-songwriter and soulful performer, Leela Gilday has a voice that comes straight from the heart. Confessing her stories to her audiences with a gutsy voice and open stage presence, Gilday weaves her experiences as a Northerner, a member of the Dene nation, and a traveller into a beautiful world that transports the listener.

Renowned international dance company Cas Public pays tribute to Beethoven's ninth symphony

Montreal dance company Cas Public – which recently won \$30,000 from the Conseil des arts de Montréal as part of the March 2017 edition of the Grand Prix – now houses an atypical performer, Cai Glover, who overcame a hearing impairment to become a professional dancer.

Choreographer Hélène Blackburn has taken the unusual step of using his disability as a point of departure for her new creation. Perceiving, experiencing, understanding: Our senses allow us to apprehend the world around us; without it things may elude us.

How is it possible to capture the monumental grandeur of the ninth symphony – one of the masterworks in the classical








ROBINSON CRUSOE + FRIDAY

This Yenene Yati/Arnat Ogausiit project is a NACC production that promises to tell a unique story not often heard in Canadian media. Its title means "women's words" in North Slavey and Siglit Inuvialuktun, and as such promises to tell a story of Indigenous women, written and performed by themselves, with the guidance of talented Indigenous women. By the time they take the stage, they will have spent 10 days writing a play at Blachford Lake Lodge, and another 10 rehearsing to provide a perspective you won't likely find anywhere else. This will also be presented at the Imago Theatre in Montreal and Native Earth Performing Arts in Toronto.



GAIL CYR Actress

Gail Cyr directed and put on The Rez Sisters by Tomson Highway in 2001 with a cast of all Indigenous actresses. A decade and a half later, people still rave about it. Cyr plans to use her knowledge of historic injustices to inspire her.



KAYLA TULUGARJUK Actress

Kayla Tulugarjuk hopes to shed light on the intersection between Indigeneity and feminism. Among her artistic achievements are a win from the NorthWords Spark! youth writing contest, and production photography for Three Feathers, a film based on the book by Richard Van Camp.



RENELTTA ARLUK Actress

Reneltta Arluk is of Inuvialuit, Cree and Dene descent and the first female Indigenous graduate of the University of Alberta's BFA acting program and founder of Akpik Theatre, the only professional Indigenous theatre company in the NWT.



TIFFANY AYALIK Actress

Tiffany Ayalik is of Inuit ancestry. She discovered her love of storytelling listening to stories from her elders in the North. Tiffany often collaborates with Greyson Gritt in their Juno-award winning band, Quantum Tangle.



YVETTE NOLAN Writer Facilitator-Dramaturge

Yvette Nolan is an Algonquin playwright, director and dramaturg. She recently co-created and co-directed Bearing with Michael Greyeyes, which premiered at Luminato Festival in Toronto.





Born 1955 in South West Victoria, Australia, Shane Howard combines a deep understanding of poetic and musical folk traditions and captures something essential of the spirit of Australia in words and music. Nevertheless, his songs have a global reach and explore universal themes.

He performed with Joe Geia for Nelson Mandela's Australian visit to Melbourne in 2000. He was a guest performer for the Australian reception to welcome Nobel Peace Prize winner Rigoberta Menchu.

2012 marked the 30th anniversary of the release of the iconic song Solid Rock, the landmark song from the album Spirit of Place. Solid Rock is now an iconic Australian song that is still heard regularly on Australian radio. The song was the first commercial song to use a didgeridoo. Its powerful lyrics and music denounced the injustice that Aboriginal Australia had lived with, since colonization in 1788.

He has been recognized with as a Member of the Order of Australia and has been awarded a fellowship by the Music Fund of the Australia Council.



Indigenous musician Yirrmal Marika, a young Yolngu man from the northern territories of Australia is an aspiring songwriter and guitarist with a beautifully powerful voice, singing songs about his homeland and culture with feeling and depth beyond his years.

"We're living in two worlds, learning in two worlds, carrying a message, a sharing of culture. We're exploring new horizons with our sound, mixing western styles with our traditional song, adding a new dimension to music," says Marika. "We aim to set an example for Indigenous youth, and to be strong, positive role models for the young generation."

Marika will be sharing the stage with Shane Howard as he tours throughout the Northwest Territories.

Notable two-member electroacoustic group Niyaz featuring Azam Ali, in collaboration with interactive designer/visual artist Jerome Delapierre, present a new international multimedia show unlike any other.

This groundbreaking experience combines live music and sacred dance performance with interactive technologies and advanced projection/body-mapping techniques that respond to sound and movement in real time. The end result creates a new kind of live musical experience, one in which virtual and real space merge to create an illusionistic three-dimensional environment that eliminates the distance between the audience and performers.


DYLAN JONES (A.K.A CROOK THE KID)


BRIAN WEADICK


AMY MATYSIO


