JEREMY DUTCHER

SHORTLISTED FOR POLARIS PRIZE

Wolastoqey singer and composer reclaiming past voices for the present and the future

Jeremy Dutcher is a classically trained operatic tenor and composer who takes every opportunity to blend his Wolastoq First Nation roots into the music he creates, blending distinct musical aesthetics that shape-shift between classical, traditional, and pop to form something entirely new.

Performer, composer, activist, musicologist — these roles are all infused into his art and way of life. His music, too, transcends boundaries: unapologetically playful in its incorporation of classical influences, full of reverence for the traditional songs of his home, and teeming with the urgency of modern-day struggles of resistance.

A member of Tobique First Nation in New Brunswick, Jeremy first did music studies in Halifax before taking a chance to work in the archives at the Canadian Museum of History, painstakingly transcribing Wolastoq songs from 1907 wax cylinders.

"Many of the songs I'd never heard before, because our musical tradition on the East Coast was suppressed by the Canadian Government's Indian Act."

Jeremy heard ancestral voices singing forgotten songs and stories that had been taken from the Wolastoqiyik generations ago. As he listened to each recording, he felt his own musical impulses stirring from deep within.

Long days at the archives turned into long nights at the piano, feeling out melodies and phrases, deep in dialogue with the voices of his ancestors. These "collaborative" compositions, collected together on his debut LP Wolastoqiyik Lintuwakonawa, are like nothing you've ever heard.

Delicate, sublime vocal melodies ring out atop piano lines that cascade through a vibrant range of emotions. The anguish and joy of the past erupt fervently into the present through Jeremy's bold approach to composition and raw, affective performances enhanced by his outstanding tenor techniques.

WESLEY HARDISTY



KIERA-DAWN KOLSON is an award-winning multi-disciplinary artist from Denendeh. Born and raised in Yellowknife, Kiera has been performing since she was a child. She released her debut album *The Dawning of a New Era* in 2017. The goal of her work is to educate, empower and engage the current and next generations to redefine Indigenous potential and give them a voice through cultural workshops, poetry, song and art. Her performance is in loving memory of Brenda Anne Kolson. loving mother, mentor, writer and friend whose passion about the north and the written word continues to inspire many near and far.

MAGGIE MERCREDI Denesoline, found a love for the performing arts in the original NACC production of "Matonabbee". A cofounding member of the Native Theatre Group of Yellowknife, performed in "The Rez Sisters" at the Walterdale Theatre in Edmonton. Being a graduate of the Centre for Indigenous Theatre in Toronto taught her the importance of cultural and traditional teachings in performances. Attending the Banff Centre for the Arts in music and storytelling residencies further enhanced her creativity. Maggie has written, produced, directed and performed original pieces that she shared in many venues, and would love to see the return of community theatre in Yellowknife.

ERNIE LENNIE is from the Northwest Territories and lives in Yellowknife. He is a former cross-country skier who competed in the 1976 Winter Olympics. His dedication for Indigenous rights, passion for cross-country skiing and his culture took him around the world. His experience at the residential school in Inuvik left a major emotional scar throughout his life. He tells stories about resilience, trauma, passion, strength and awareness. The audience will have a unique opportunity to learn from this world-class advocate and athlete.

WESLEY HARDISTY is a fiddler and composer whose music blends rock, country, folk, Celtic and Métis sounds. His playing is compelling to watch, and his passion for music shows. Wesley is from the Dene First Nation. Largely self taught, he took up fiddle at age thirteen in Fort Simpson through the outreach work of the Kole Crook Fiddle Association. He attended the prestigious Gulf Islands School of Performing Arts on Saltspring Island, BC. His debut CD 12:12 won the 2012 Aboriginal Peoples Choice Music Award for Best Fiddle CD. Just 22, he has an impressive resume with hundreds of gigs, festivals and TV performances.

One of Canada's favourite songwriters is hitting the road this fall with a career-spanning retrospective collection and concert tour to match

I've been writing and performing since I was a kid so I figured, it's time...I'm celebrating over 25 years as a singer songwriter with a collection of hit songs and fan favourites that I wrote spanning my years with The Rankin Family and as a solo artist.

immy Rankin is going for it. Twenty-five years into a career that has seen him embraced as one of Canada's most beloved singer-songwriters and hit makers, with platinum albums and pretty much every award the nation hands out, Rankin has decided now's the time: on his new Back Road Paradise, you'll hear him like never before, full-on country.

Jimmy Rankin is putting together his first-ever collection that draws on both his solo hits and his time with his legendary family band, The Rankins.

Jimmy Rankin is known for a string of award-winning hits that have placed him at the forefront of the singer-songwriter movement in the country, including "Followed Her Around," "Here in My Heart," "Tripper" and "Cool Car." But going back to the Rankin days, he was also the writer who penned many of their chart-topping classics.

For this tour celebrating the (as-yet untitled) retrospective album, Jimmy will focus on the hits on the collection, but also keep it loose for plenty of surprises.

"It's turned into a real singer-songwriter show. It's relaxed, I have a skeleton set list, and people yell out requests and I'll sing them if I have time."

It's the best of both worlds, acoustic and intimate for the ballads, and the ability to add some energy for the fun ones. "It's not a sleeper show by any means," Jimmy said. "You get the crowd singing out and we can really rock it. It's fun, I sort of enjoy it more than having a bigger band, it gives you flexibility to improv a lot."

All that experience, all that musical history will make this fall's retrospective tour an exciting one for all Jimmy Rankin fans. He might pull out what he calls a "cult favourite," such as "Tripper" from his Song Dog album, or "Borders and Time" from North Country and recent hits, like "Whiskey When the Sun Goes Down," or the much-loved "Butterfly."

Eckhardt-Gramatté National Music Competition 2018 Winner's Tour

The Eckhardt-Gramatté National Music Competition is an annual contemporary music competition for exceptional emerging Canadian performing artists in piano, voice, and strings.

For 40 years, the annual E-Gré Competition and Winner's Tour have played a significant role in the early careers of performers recognized nationally and internationally for their achievements in music. E-Gré prize winners include Officers of the Order of Canada James Ehnes, Ben Heppner and Jon Kimura Parker.

Each year, a Winner's Tour of ten to twelve concerts across Canada is awarded as part of the 1st-prize package. The E-Gré Competition fosters the creation of new music by living Canadian composers through the commissioning of a test piece each year.

The commissioned work is performed at each concert, and the 2018 commissioned work is by Yellowknife composer Carmen Braden titled Foxy Fox's Musical Games.

By supporting the creation of 35 new works and encouraging performances of Canadian compositions since 1976, the E-Gré Competition is helping to build a musical cultural legacy for Canada.

Originally from Regina, Saskatchewan, Amy collaborates with musicians from around the world to explore new approaches to classical and contemporary music. Amy was a 2017 artist-in-residence at La Cité Internationale des Arts in Paris. She is also the winner of the 2018 Eckhardt-Gramatté Competition, the 2017 McGill Concerto Competition, the Sylva Gelber Foundation Music Award, and a doctoral fellowship from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council. Her principal teachers have been Axel Strauss, Ian Swensen, Denise Lupien and Eduard Minevich. Amy is a member of the Montreal-based SOMA Quartet as well as first violinist and manager of the prairie-based Horizon String Quartet.

KATHERINE DOWLING

Praised by the New York Times for her "crystalline performances, gestural expressiveness, and careful attention to color", and by the Boston Globe for her "effortless incisiveness", award-winning Canadian pianist Dr. Katherine Dowling has performed across North America and Europe. Equally compelling as a solo, collaborative, and ensemble player, she has performed as a member of the New Fromm Players of the Tanglewood Festival, Gruppo Montebello ensemble (Etcetera label), and enjoys close associations with The Orlando Festival, The Banff Centre, and the Aldeburgh Festival. She credits her teacher Gil Kalish as the major influence in her musical life.

Joanne Shenandoah, Ph.D., is a Grammy Award winner with 3 Nominations, and has over 40 music awards including 14 Native American Music awards and a Hall of Fame Inductee with music ranging from solo to full symphony and 22 recordings.

Her music spans a diverse range of sounds – from traditional chants to contemporary ballads of Native ways. Her music has been described as an emotional experience, a "Native American trance." She sings in both English and Oneida.

ZENSHIP

ZENSHIP IS POETICS, TRANCE AND JAZZ

An improvised love affair, an ancient spacecraft, high poems, jazz hypnosis, a funk meditation. ZENSHIP is a Tanya Evanson project based in Tiotià:ke/ Montreal, Canada inspired by The Ten Bull progression of short poems and pictures used in Zen Buddhism to illustrate stages of enlightenment. We are in the continuum of griots, mystics, monks, musicians, sufis, singers and healers. We are the star nation and we have the original instructions.

" My current project ZENSHIP combines poetics, trance and free jazz. We are five musicians creating work that I believe is more universal than my solo stuff vet simultaneously more difficult to market. ZENSHIP is a text-based music project, but most literary festivals wouldn't have the budget to bring in a five-piece band and so I'm looking toward jazz and experimental art festivals. It's altogether a different — albeit exciting — animal."



FIELD --- MARTIN MESSIER

Messier gives material form to the electromagnetic energy omnipresent in our environment. He becomes the operator through whom these residual electric signals are picked up by electromagnetic microphones. Using aluminum panels interconnected by patch cables, Messier manipulates these invisible forces to create a hypnotizing visual and sonic spectacle, becoming a conductor in a sense for electromagnetic energy. His work demonstrates the interdependence between forces and their environment - including us. A veritable mimesis of electromagnetic current, the visual aspect can plunge the audience into a hypnotic state: the omnipresent imperceptible power that surrounds us is stripped of its mystery and finally seems accessible to us.





SILENT FILM CONCERT

With pianist Roman Zavada

Pianist Roman Zavada takes you on a journey through time revisiting classics of the silent movie era and reviving the profession of accompanist. He improvises with the black and white keys of the piano to give a musical emotion in perfect harmony with the action of the film. Through the fantastic universe



of Georges Méliès and the burlesque comedy of Chaplin, Keaton and Laurel and Hardy, the public will rediscover these little treasures which have since been forgotten. With his spontaneous and impressive musical narration, Roman Zavada magically becomes an accomplice to the black and white images on screen.

With stylistic grace and an adventurous spirit, Vancouver's Singing Lions have enriched and transformed people's lives through singing for over twenty-five years. Chor Leoni performs in many languages and styles and genres, always aiming to communicate, engage, and entertain.

They perform annually to over 15,000 patrons and are one of the most active amateur choirs in North America. The choir is fortunate and privileged to sing on the unceded traditional territory of the Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh First Nations.

The ensemble has been honoured with many awards at the national and international level including five 1st place awards in the CBC National Radio Competition for Amateur Choirs. In July 2012, Chor Leoni won a dozen awards at the 51st Concorso Internazionale di Canto Corale "Seghizzi" (Italy), including 1st place trophies in the 19th and 20th

Century categories, two Audience Favourite awards, and second place in the competition's overall Grand Prix.

They pride themselves on their musical ambassadorship for Vancouver and Canada and have performed at major music festivals and concert venues across Canada and the United States. Internationally, the choir has shared its music in Italy, Croatia, Bosnia, Germany, and the Czech Republic.

Chor Leoni has been a champion of new music and has commissioned hundreds of pieces for male choir, ranging from pop and folksong arrangements to modern works. The ensemble has commissioned works by notable composers such as Robert Sund, Stephen Chatman, Bruce Sled, Jocelyn Morlock, Malcolm Forsyth, R. Murray Schaefer, Bob Chilcott, Steven Smith, and Peter Togni among others. Chor Leoni was founded in 1992 by Diane Loomer C.M. and is currently conducted by Erick Lichte.

Paul McCandless and three jazz virtuosos cross stylistic boundaries, blending diverse musical traditions into one engaging new sonic experience

Grammy award winner and world renowned-jazz superstar Paul McCandless and the Bay-Area jazz trio Charged Particles will be playing compositions from McCandless's solo records with a fresh twist and new energy.

Known for soaring lyricism and gorgeous compositions, McCandless plays soprano, tenor, and sopranino saxophones, oboes, English horn, bass clarinet, penny whistles, and a collection of folk flutes. As a leader, he has released 30 records.

The trio's repertoire blends jazz with elements of Latin music, funk, fusion, classical music, romantic ballads, purely improvised adventures, and original McCandless styles that have no names. The group's original compositions are mixtures of complex orchestration and elaborate improvised solos.

The band brings a similar approach to playing arrangements of

tunes by other jazz artists and traditional jazz standards by the composers of America's most popular songs from decades ago, each played with a new twist.

The band's performance will feature four musicians as they explore the musical mind of one of today's living geniuses.

Paul McCandless has brought the soaring lyricism in his playing and composing to the ensemble sound of two seminal iconic bands of jazz: the original Paul Winter consort and the relentlessly innovative quartet, Oregon.

The trio's music has a distinctly acoustic sensibility, despite the members playing both electric and acoustic instruments. The group's small size allows for sensitivity and spontaneity among the players, making each performance an enchanting improvisational exploration.




BRIAN WEADICK

Establishing himself as one of Canada's most promising young artists, 24 year-old violinist Blake Pouliot is the Grand Prize winner of the 2016 Orchestra Symphonique de Montréal (OSM) Manulife Competition. After his performance of the Korngold Violin Concerto at his debut with the Montreal Symphony and conductor Vasily Petrenko in February 2017, he was described by Montreal's La Presse as "Clearly. Absolutely. Undoubtedly virtuoso." In 2018, Mr. Pouliot released his debut album featuring the works of Ravel and Debussy.

Since his solo orchestral debut with the Toronto Trinity Chamber Orchestra at age 11, Mr. Pouliot has performed as soloist with the Aspen Philharmonic Orchestra. Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra, Ottawa Symphony, the Sofia Philharmonic Orchestra in Bulgaria, Toronto Symphony Orchestra, and the Colburn Orchestra at Walt Disney Concert Hall, and with conductors Sir Neville Marriner. Nicolas McGegan, Tito Muñoz, Carl St. Clair, Alain Trudel, and Hugh Wolff. Mr. Pouliot has performed in recital in Chicago, Los Angeles, Montreal, Toronto, and was featured on Rob Kapilow's What Makes it Great? series with Beethoven's Kreutzer Sonata at the Cerritos Center for the Performing Arts.

A featured performer on CBC Radio Canada on numerous occasions. Mr. Pouliot has received several honors in Canada. In 2013 he received the Canada Council for the Arts' Michael Measure Prize which gave him



NACC COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROJECT

LIVE YOUR GIFTS **CREATIVE EXPRESSION ART SHOP**

A cross-generational project to cultivate youth into well-rounded artists, teaching them the art of writing poetry, music and photography with mentorship from Elders and seasoned artists.

NACC will partner with Yellowknife musician, performer, educator, and speaker Kiera Kolson and photographer Blaire Russell to deliver two-day multidisciplinary workshops in Enterprise, K'atl'odeeche First Nation Reserve, and Fort Simpson, followed by performances. The Art Shop will teach youth a sense of identity, to recognize and draw from the shapes and natural beauty of the land to create works. Youth will work in an organized setting with companion artists to develop self-esteem and gain teamwork skills.

Artists and Elders will use a cross-collaborative and intergenerational creative approach to engage vouth across Denendeh to participate in skill development, harm reduction, cultural pride and suicide prevention through artistic and personal development and cultural awareness. Elders will teach youth with a holistic view of First Nations traditional history and spirituality, knowledge of techniques and tools, and provide guidance to build confidence in their abilities. Exchanging ideas with Elders and sharing spiritual

and cultural values, traditions and customs from the five regions will support greater intercultural understanding and engagement between community Elders and youth.

Kiera-Dawn Kolson is an award-winning multidisciplinary artist from Denendeh and works with communities to educate, empower and engage Indigenous youth. Her passion and dedication to her performance and craft has blessed her with many opportunities to share the importance of Indigenous rights, women's rights, environmental rights, nationally and internationally through presentations, performances and facilitated workshops.



BLAIRE RUSSELL

Blaire Russell is a photographer, artist and filmmaker from the Lone Fighters clan of the Kainaiwa tribe of the Blackfoot Confederacy. Much of Russell's work is focused on photographic portraiture until his recent work, a mixed media series entitled Nitaisskohkotawa, touched on themes of reclaiming identity and Blackfoot spirituality.

OCTOBER

Blaire is also an educator within the art community focusing on art, resilience and reconciliation in a modern Indigenous perspective. Blaire hopes to bridge Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities through art and the spirit of iiniistsi, the Blackfoot translation for "sacred treaty and alliance".


